## 6.1 COASTAL HAZARD RISK MANAGEMENT AND ADAPTATION PLAN - STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT

Presenters: GHD - Nicola Hoey and Racquel Buis-Kerr

#### **SUMMARY**

A Coastal Hazard Risk Management Adaption Plan (CHRMAP) is a strategic planning document required for local governments under State policy and the Planning and Development Act 2005. Development of the CHRMAP follows a well-established process and will update the existing Coastal Adaptation Plan (2015).

A CHRMAP details management and adaptation controls for coastal areas to preserve valued assets in sustainable, considered ways. These coastal assets include both built and natural assets, which provide social, environmental, economic and heritage values to the community. CHRMAPs inform other local planning documents by providing a framework for managing future coastal vulnerabilities. They allow informed decision making to occur by coordinating integrated and sustainable land use planning in the short and long term.

The first stage of this project includes confirmation of the values of the City's coastline through completion of:

- 1. A desktop assessment and gap analysis (using previous studies, consultation, databases etc. to document existing coastal values such as recreation, natural assets, community infrastructure and local heritage).
- 2. Community values survey to confirm how the coastline is used and valued.
- 3. In-person engagement to discuss how the coastline is used and valued directly.

We are seeking input from the Boola Maara Consultative Committee into the first stage of the CHRMAP. Understanding how the Kwinana coast is used and valued will inform how the coast is managed into the future.

#### **OFFICER RECOMMENDATION**

That the Boola Maara Aboriginal Consultative Committee consider and provide comment on community and stakeholder coastal values in the context of the Coastal Hazard Risk Management Adaptation Plan.

This plan is being prepared to adapt to the changing coast along the City of Kwinana and provides recommended timeframes and trigger points for decision-making and planning for the Kwinana coast. The plan is being prepared as the first iteration of an evolving, long-term planning and decision-making process for the City of Kwinana, the community, and key stakeholders to adapt



our settlements and infrastructure to coastal processes - including risks of coastal erosion and inundation.

The CHRMAP will allow consideration of coastal hazards in the provision of public open space, maintaining access to clean air and water.

#### Generational value creation

The CHRMAP will consider coastal hazards in both long and short-term scenarios to assess likely or possible economic, environmental, social and ethical impacts. This can be considered in planning and land use decisions in the coastal zone.

#### Integrated and transparent decision-making

Engagement with community and internal and external stakeholders is integral to understanding what is important and valued in the coastal zone to incorporate into consideration of risk and make recommendations for the future.

#### Thriving local economy

Consideration of coastal hazards is essential in the continued use of the Kwinana Industrial Area.

#### **Environmental stewardship**

Consideration of coastal hazards will include impact to natural areas to ensure these are protected and maintained where possible.

#### Resilient and adaptable communities

Assessment of coastal hazards and vulnerability to those hazards is essential to planning future use of the coast.



### 6.2 DEPARTMENT OF PLANNING, LANDS AND HERITAGE ABORIGINAL CONSERVATION - USE OF THOMAS OVAL AND SLOAN'S RESERVE

#### **SUMMARY**

The Events Team has recently been in contact with the Department of Planning, Lands and Heritage (DPLH) following correspondence from them regarding new approval process for gaining permission for activities that may impact or harm Aboriginal heritage, in line with the *Aboriginal Heritage Regulations* 1974.

Officers have enquired to confirm the actions and uses of Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Places that require approval to ensure proper and respectful use of the land was maintained.

The DPLH informed us that soccer and sports are permitted, but other minor acts under section 10 need approval. Section 10 relates to minor activities and events. Any events held on registered sites, will now require formal approval from the DPLH. The purpose of this report is to inform the Committee of the contact we had, the response we received and discover where in the approvals process the committee would like us to seek their approval for events.

#### **ABORIGINAL HERITAGE REGULATIONS 1974 - REG 10**

#### 10. Activities requiring consent

On any land to which these regulations apply, a person shall not, without the written consent of the Minister or the Registrar or a person authorised in writing by the Minister or the Registrar —

- (a) alter, damage, or destroy any notice, boundary, fence, shelter, grille, cutting, drain, protective work or other thing which the Registrar or any officer of the Department has, or has caused to be, erected, constructed, made or placed thereon or therein;
- (b) dig any hole or otherwise disturb the surface of the ground, or remove or disturb any stone, soil, sand, rock or gravel, or any other natural object;
- (c) cut, pick, pull, break, remove, take, injure, poison, strip or destroy any tree, shrub, herb, grass or other plant or part thereof whether living or dead;
- (d) post, stick, stamp, stencil, paint, draw or otherwise affix or make any mark, symbol, lettering, notice, advertisement poster, sign or document of any description;
- (e) except in a place approved or provided for the purpose
  - (i) drive, tow, operate or park any vehicle;
  - (ii) camp, erect tents or shelters, light fires or make fireplaces;
  - (iii) deposit or leave any refuse, rubbish or litter; or
  - (iv) take, ride or drive, graze or agist any horse, cattle, sheep, goat, camel, donkey or pig, or allow any such animal to remain;
- (f) sell any food, beverage or other article;
- (g) unlock, unfasten or leave open any gate unless duly authorised to do so; or
- (h) except with the prior written approval of the Minister, or the Registrar, and in accordance with such requirements as they may impose, take any photograph or make any recording for the purpose of commercial reproduction or publication.

Penalty: a fine of \$2 000.

### REQUEST FOR ADVICE – PROPOSESD EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES OF A COMMERCIAL NATURE BEING HELD ON THOMAS OVAL SPORTING GROUNDS

Thank you for your inquiry dated 23 May 2025 seeking comment from the Department of Planning, Lands and Heritage (DPLH), Aboriginal Heritage Conservation Team, regarding the proposed events or activities being held on Thomas Oval located at Lot 1084 on DP 216209.

A review of the Register of Places and Objects, as well as the DPLH Aboriginal Heritage Database, confirms that the subject area intersects with the actual boundary of registered Aboriginal site Thomas Oval (ID 3710).

Therefore, based on the current information held by DPLH approvals under the *Aboriginal Heritage Act 1972* (AHA) are required for any significant impacts that intersect the boundary of Aboriginal site Thomas Oval (ID 3710), and consent under Regulation 7 and 10 of the *Aboriginal Heritage Regulations* (AHR) for minor activities and impacts. I note Regulation 7 and 10 consents can be approved by either the Minister or the Registrar. Please refer to the DPLH website at <u>Aboriginal Heritage Approvals</u> for more information.

You can find further information on minor activities requiring consent in the AHR. I can confirm you do not require approval for playing soccer as it is an area provided for that purpose. For an event, it would depend on what activity is associated with that event. I recommend seeking advice from DPLH with further details on specific events via the ACHknowledge portal.




