Support those who are making this important commitment by casting your vote for both the new Mayor and their Council team.


You will also learn more about how your rates will be spent this financial year – a question we are often asked.

Leaving a Legacy in Local Government

Budget Outlook

The City of Kwinana's 2023/24 budget focuses on meeting the community's vision for Kwinana and its expectations for quality service, while managing the complex needs and challenges associated with the City's expansive and fast-paced growth.

Kwinana's population has now surpassed the 50,000 milestone, meaning the City is needing to keep pace with a rapidly growing population in the context of rising costs.

Key Budget highlights for 2023/24 include:

- \$11.8 million towards roads, streetlights, footpaths, drainage and car parks upgrades and renewals
- \$3.2 million for community centres and library services
- \$10.6 million towards upgrades to parks, ovals and public open space

- \$497,000 for the annual community events program

Bike Skills Track

The Calista Bike Skills Track opened in time for the July school holidays with young children enjoying the mini traffic lights and signs, speed bumps, park and play areas plus the imaginative play charging station to top up that bike or scooter.

Located at Calista Oval, north of the Edge Skatepark, the playful facility has been designed with the purpose of educating primary school aged children on correct road rules and safe cycling behaviours.

The project was funded by the State Government through the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries as part of the election commitment grant program, secured by the Hon Roger Cook as Kwinana MLA, and RAC WA.



Drainage <u>nets</u>

Five innovative drainage nets have collectively stopped 3660.5kg of waste and debris polluting local parks and reserves.

Six years ago, in March 2018, two drainage nets were installed at Henley Nature Reserve and the success of the nets went viral on social media in August that same year, inundating the City with media calls and emails from across the globe to find out more about this simple yet effective solution to prevent pollution.

A further three nets were installed during the 2019/20 financial year at Orelia Oval, Sloan's Reserve and Oakley Road to intercept more solid waste like food wrappers, drink bottles, cans, debris and organic waste being conveyed by the piped drainage system.



Kwinana City Centre Precinct <u>Plan</u>

The City of Kwinana has begun the process of preparing a Precinct Structure Plan for Kwinana City Centre. The purpose of the Precinct Structure Plan is to guide future zoning, subdivision and development in the City Centre and to optimise its potential as a vibrant location for retail, restaurant, entertainment, arts, childcare, education, health services, social services and short-term accommodation.

The community will be asked to share their views shortly in the first phase of consultation; keep an eye out for further information on the Council's website and around the City Centre. Let's work together to reimagine a thriving, vibrant hub in the heart of Kwinana.

GO <u>Bins</u>

The City is set to GO with the move to a Garden Organics (GO) waste system commencing in the 2024/25 financial year, providing residents with more options for sorting their waste and reducing what gets sent to landfill.

There is a strong demand for a third bin, and with an average of 34 per cent of Kwinana's general waste bin filled with compostable garden organics, specifically leaves, weeds and lawn clippings, the GO bin will be a welcome addition. The benefits of the three-bin GO system are many.



When residents are using their GO bin the end product is compost, with the potential to be used on public parks or bagged and used in gardens. Our community knows the value in diverting waste from landfill and this introduction of the GO bin will improve the amount of waste we are able to recover, diverting organic waste from going to landfill.

The City undertook extensive engagement with community and key stakeholders to determine the appetite for a third bin. A comprehensive feasibility assessment was conducted that considered a range of factors across economic, environmental, social and governance outcomes, whereby GO demonstrated the best value for money for the Kwinana community at this time.

The State Government Waste Avoidance and Resource Recovery Strategy 2030 details its recommendation for all Perth metropolitan and Peel region Councils to transition to Food Organics and Garden Organics (FOGO), and the City's announcement is the start of the journey.

For our community, the best way forward is GO. This coupled with our commitment to the Waste to Energy plant will see us best placed to meet our waste goals.



NAIDOC Week celebrations began with a launch at Medina Hall, organised by the Indigenous Institute of Sport and Wellbeing on Monday 26 June, followed by a special event at the Moorditj Kulungars playgroup on the Tuesday morning.

A luncheon honouring local Elders was held at the Kwinana Bowling Club on Wednesday, 28 June, followed by the Medina Aboriginal Cultural Centre's Family Day in Apex Park on the Thursday.

The Little Peeps Roller Disco kept young ones entertained with NAIDOC Week activities at Astroskate, and The Zone Youth Space offered youth activities throughout the week.

The celebrations wrapped up with the Nyoongar Boodja NAIDOC footy game, proudly supported by the City of Kwinana and the Kwinana Knights, which was held on 9 July at Medina Oval with activities for all ages, come and try session, face painting and inflatable games.



Get together and get to know your neighbours this Spring!

The City of Kwinana is offering \$150 reimbursement costs to local residents for a 'street meet' activity in your local neighbourhood.

City of Kwinana residents and businesses can now apply for a subsidy of up to \$500, or \$750 for health care card holders, to install a new CCTV system and/ or sensor lights on their premises.

Closed circuit television (CCTV) can deter potential offenders from criminal activity and help with detection, investigation, and prosecution of offenders. This initiative aims to increase the number of CCTV systems within the City in an effort to make it a safer place for everyone. The City's CCTV Security Subsidy opens 2 November and closes 2 December 2023, or until funds are exhausted.

Specialist homelessness services welcomed

A new partnership has resulted in specialist homelessness services being made available in Kwinana for the first time.

The City of Kwinana is partnering with St Pat's Community Support Centre (St Pat's) to provide a specialist assertive outreach service in Kwinana, using the HEART model, supported by the State Government through the Office of Homelessness. Communities across Australia have been experiencing a spike in homelessness brought about by the pandemic, and cost of living pressures.


Recent statistics in August showed there were 191 known people experiencing homeless in Rockingham and Kwinana, with 115 rough sleeping, including 37 children under 18 years. Due to limited resources in the region, we know this number to be a lot higher.



You might have seen a new café operating out of the Kwinana Recquatic, but did you know it was the first social enterprise café for Good Sammy Enterprises, and that the star design on its signage represents 'good thanks' in braille'?

The Good Thanks Café opened 10 July in a partnership that helps both the City of Kwinana and Good Sammy achieve their goals of embracing diversity and creating employment opportunities for people living with a disability.

Good Thanks barista, Tomsie, was excited to work at the café when it opened.



The City of Kwinana would like to acknowledge the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries (DLGSC) and the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Fund (LRCI) as major supporters of the Wellard Oval Club Night Light Project. DLGSC contributed \$136,166 and LRCI contributed \$300,000 towards the construction and installation of four dimmable 100 Lux LED lighting towers at Wellard Oval. The installation of these light towers enables local user groups and clubs to now access Wellard Oval Complex for night-time training, competition, and events. The Kwinana Wolves Rugby Club and Kwinana Little

St Pat's Chief Executive Michael Piu said St Pats was proud to be partnering with the City and congratulated the City for responding to this need by providing specialist support for those who were facing homelessness in the community.

"Our experienced team of assertive outreach workers specialise in providing targeted, flexible support for people experiencing rough sleeping," Mr Piu said.

"We work side-by-side with people to identify their needs, connect them with services and assist them as they transition into safe, secure accommodation," he said. The City is also continuing to advocate regionally, with other neighbouring local governments and service providers.

"I've always felt passionately about working in hospitality to show that my disability doesn't affect my capability to work in an industry I love," said Good Thanks barista, Tomsie.

Good Sammy Chief Executive Officer, Kane Blackman, thanked the City of Kwinana for their leadership in seeking to deliver disability employment outcomes in their community with the café employing up to 15 locals, of which 50 per cent would be people with disability.

"We are strongly focused on transforming workplaces and society by creating employment opportunities for people with disability, and the hospitality sector is a great place to deliver those customer-facing roles," Mr Blackman said.

The café is currently open 9.30am to 5.30pm, Monday to Friday.

Athletics Centre are very excited to be able to utilise these lights for many sports seasons to come. The City of Kwinana also recently supported the Kwinana Cricket Club, located in Orelia, with a \$10,000 contribution towards the installation of two lighting towers that now light up the Cricket Nets located on Orelia Oval. Having the two nets lit enables the Kwinana Cricket Club and community user groups to safely train under lights no matter the weather or season. Supporting sport and recreation projects such as these, builds stronger, healthier, happier and safer communities. When we play sport our whole community wins!

Andria arrived in Australia from India in May, visited the Kwinana Volunteer Centre and was soon volunteering with Tech Time in the Library.

Andria's unwavering passion for technology and computers led her to a fulfilling role as a volunteer for a period of time while opening up other employment opportunities.

"I was very nervous initially unknown of the Australian culture," Andria said.

"But all the customers and other volunteers and staff were really helpful and approachable.

"I was able to learn about the culture and it was really easy to interact with all of them.

"Of all, the best feeling was to see how

happy some of the customers were when they had it worked out," she said.

Koorliny

The City of Kwinana took over the day-to-day operations of the Koorliny Arts Centre from 1 July after the Koorliny Arts Centre Incorporated advised it would be ceasing its management.

The Koorliny Arts Centre is a valuable asset in the City as an award-winning theatre and entertainment venue with shows, workshops and classes for the whole family. The Koorliny Arts Centre is the artistic heart of Kwinana, inspiring creativity, expression and imagination with their program offering for more than a decade. The City of Kwinana is committed to ensuring this continues into the future.

The Centre employs a number of staff who were retained during this period to ensure the day-to-day operations including facility operations, booking performance seasons, managing in-house programs and venue hire bookings, ticket sales, and promotion are not impacted.

SPIRIT Spotlight



The Frank Konecny Community Centre was awarded a Kwinana Community Funding grant from the City of Kwinana to purchase the materials needed to create mosaic signs that say 'hi', 'hello' and 'welcome' in multiple languages to celebrate the diverse cultures that make up our community.

Utilising the centre's enrolment forms and the City's information, 22 languages were identified to mosaic, to create inclusivity for all who attend the centre. The centre ran 10 free multicultural workshop days where anyone could help create the mosaics in a safe and welcoming environment.

This gave our community a chance to learn new skills and new words, meet new people and engage with others while helping to create an inclusive project that will proudly become a permanent fixture on the centre's exterior walls.

Once the initial stage of tile placement was complete we had community volunteers grout, build frames and create wording to label each sign with the definition, pronunciation and language the mosaic represented.

A launch event was held on 28 August with a morning tea and a chance to practise the greeting in each language.



Litter and Illegal Dumping

The City of Kwinana has prepared its first Litter and Illegal Dumping Plan, confirming its commitment to tackling the issue in the area.

Litter and Illegal Dumping within the City has environmental and health impacts as well as financial implications. Last year the City spent over \$600k in the removal of illegal dumping in our community.

The plan is structured to include three main goals which includes reducing litter and illegal dumping, improving how litter and illegal dumping is managed and increasing community awareness and empowerment.

We are working with significant landholders within the City boundaries to manage the litter and illegal dumping activity in areas not managed by the City. Residents are also being encouraged to be part of the solution by reporting any litter and illegal dumping they see. There are simple ways to report litter and illegal dumping through our Report-It page. Research has shown that litter leads to litter and dumping leads to dumping, so a key message for our community is don't ignore it, remove it or report it!



Bushfire prevention tips

According to the Bureau of Meteorology, the next few months are expected to be hotter and drier than average therefore increasing the risk of bushfire.

Tips to help prepare and protect your property include:

- Create a 20-metre building protection zone around your property if your property is larger than 1500sqm.
- Clear the area of rubbish, long grass and other materials that could catch fire.
- Protect your house from ember attack by fitting wire screens and shutters. Block any gaps under the floor, roof, eaves, external vents, skylights, chimneys, and wall cladding.
- Have an emergency water supply that is independent of mains water supply.
- Discuss fire prevention and preparedness with your family and neighbours.



The Kwinana South Volunteer Bushfire Brigade is now operating out of a new station with improved changing facilities, amenities, PPE washroom, standalone offices and training room.

The \$1.9 million building was funded by the Department of Fire and Emergency Services through the Emergency Services Levy (\$1.51 million) and the Australian Government (\$400,000) through a Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Grant.

The Department also handed over a new fire-fighting appliance with better welfare, lighting and crew protection features.

The City continues to administer two local volunteer brigades, in Mandogalup and Kwinana South, actively encouraging recruitment and providing onboarding and a new recruit training program. For more information about volunteer firefighting, call the DFES recruitment hotline on 1800 628 141.
