The website **www.lovemykwinana. com** was first launched in 2020 as part of the Strategic Community Plan review. Today it's used as the central point for two-way digital dialogue between the City and the community.

Wow, what an amazing seven days!

The Strand in Wellard has a new look, designed to encourage people to linger longer in the space.

At the community's request, the City of Kwinana partnered with RAC through its Reconnect WA initiative to makeover the street in just seven days.

The process was overseen by David Engwicht - a world-renowned place maker, community activator and champion of public spaces - from Creative Communities International.

The local business community, youth, City staff and Councillors joined residents of all ages to transform the space with opportunities to be involved from the ideas generation phase to project planning, fundraising and rolling up their sleeves to complete the makeover.

More than 169 volunteers participated from the project, with many attending

multiple days, resulting in an impressive 442 total volunteer days.

A launch party at the end offered residents a tour of the new installations which include landscaping, fun play areas, and beautiful pergolas.

Colourful hexagonal seating and matching coverings over remaining bollards were installed along the length of The Strand, along with a lovely nature play area, a community piano donated by Sandra Hird, a children's climbing frame, a youth-inspired wishing well(ard), and an ever-popular 'arcade area' with

outdoor games like ping pong and checkers for families to enjoy.

The project responded directly to feedback from the Wellard community regarding the area and their aspirations for a more vibrant and active neighbourhood centre.

City of Kwinana Mayor Carol Adams thanked RAC for their partnership, and everyone who had been involved in making the revitalisation come to life.

"We are also grateful to David Engwicht and Creative Communities for contributing a wealth of international experience navigating change through the power of community," Mayor Adams said.

"It is lovely to see children playing and hear piano music on your way to the shops or café, and to see families enjoying somewhere beautiful to sit after buying a meal from a Wellard business.

"A big heartfelt thanks to all the people who inspired the makeover and took time out of their week to build, paint or plan the transformation project," she said.

Grant support

The City of Kwinana distributed over \$200,000 in grants and funding to the local community over the 2022/23 financial year. The new CCTV rebate scheme has seen nearly \$40,000 distributed to local home and business owners for the installation of CCTV and sensor lights in a partnership with Local Police to improve the CCTV network coverage in the area.

\$40,000 in Kwinana Community Funding Grants, co-funded by the Kwinana Community Chest, helped support 14 different community groups, ranging from sporting clubs to not for profits, to deliver projects across the City. Twenty-seven grants were also COMMUNITY



The Calista Bike Skills Track is progressing nicely thanks to LD Total, with completion expected in June.

The project was funded by the State Government through the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries as part of the election commitment grant program, secured by the Hon Roger Cook as Kwinana MLA, and RAC WA.

Located at Calista Oval, north of The Edge Skatepark, the playful facility has been designed with the purpose of educating primary school aged children on correct road rules and safe cycling behaviours.

It will include a set of mini traffic lights, traffic signs to simulate a road environment, speed bumps and park and play areas.

It even includes an imaginative play charging station to top up that bike or scooter.

The track will be free to use and designed for both a quick visit or an affordable family day out with nearby oval facilities, barbecue areas, The Edge Skate Park and the adjacent Kwinana Adventure Park.





The City of Kwinana is inviting you to have your say on the draft Local Planning Strategy, to help shape the City's land use vision and ensure that the strategy accurately reflects the community's input and vision for the future.

A Local Planning Strategy is a long-term plan that guides land use and development within a Local Government area over a 10 to 15-year period and is carried through into more detailed local planning scheme, strategies, policies, structure planning, subdivision and development.

The City of Kwinana's draft Local Planning Strategy aims to combine a range of economic, social and environmental issues to ensure that the City is well positioned to accommodate

the changes expected to occur into the

These changes have been forecast through a number of technical studies and include a growing population; requirements for diverse types of housing; increasing infrastructure including sporting, retail and community facilities; industrial and business expansion; and environmental protections.

The City's new draft Local Planning Strategy specifically aims to ensure that:


• there are local centres established to provide a local hub with convenient access to shops and services for the surrounding community;

- housing density and diversity is accommodated around our neighbourhood centres and the City
- support is provided for business areas, the new port and expanded industry, including secure freight routes; and
- there is increased protection for the City's environmental areas.

The City of Kwinana undertook a significant consultation exercise to gain input from the community to help inform the Strategy's development and now we're checking that the draft Strategy reflects that input by inviting you to provide feedback at **lovemykwinana.com** by 30 June 2023.

The City of Kwinana has recently launched a Community Services Working Group.


Through this working group, the City of Kwinana is bringing together our community service sector with the purpose of identifying strengths within the community in addition to any gaps

How your rates are calculated RiD Rate in the Dollar Rate Payable



How your rates are calculated

It's nearly that time of the year again, rates time! Have you ever wondered how your rates are calculated?

Calculating the amount of rates everyone in the City should pay is a pretty complex task. Local Governments calculate the rates to be paid on your individual property by using the following formula: property valuation multiplied by the rate in the dollar (RiD) = rates payable.

Firstly, the City calculates the rate in the dollar (RiD) by determining its own operating costs, which includes the cost of labour, or jobs, the cost of materials, such as light fittings and gardening equipment, the cost of running programs and events and providing support services to the community.

Then the City divides its operating costs, which it tries to offset by seeking funding from other sources such as the State or Federal Governments, by the value of all the 'rateable properties' in Kwinana, which calculates the rate in the dollar (RiD).

The value of the rateable properties in Kwinana is determined by Landgate, of the WA State Government, who values the total properties in the City of Kwinana and calls this the 'Gross Rental Valuation' or GRV. This valuation is reviewed every three years, with a new valuation being used from the 1 July 2023, to help calculate the share of rates to be paid by each landowner.

The property valuation, or GRV, is then multiplied by the rate in the dollar (RiD) to calculate the rates payable for each property.

The City of Kwinana in partnership with the Museum of Perth have been working to restore Sloan's Cottage and establish a large productive garden.

Sloan's Cottage Garden Tour and Talk will take place in the cottage grounds at Harman Place in Leda from 9.30am to 12pm on 18 June.

In addition to seeing the restoration works, you will have the opportunity to learn how to make your own productive garden with gardening and composting expert Peg Davies who was recently on Gardening Australia.

BurnWise this Winter


Winter is well and truly here. If you currently own or are looking to purchase a wood heater for your home, would you know how to reduce wood smoke?

Wood smoke is a complex mix of gases and fine particles, which are the product of incomplete combustion. These fine particles can aggravate respiratory illnesses. Smoke from wood heaters contributes significantly to air pollution or haze during the winter months.

- Store firewood in a dry place and only burn dry wood.
- Use plenty of kindling and paper to establish a hot bright fire quickly.
- Leave space inside the firebox for air to circulate.
- Keep air controls fully open for 10 minutes after lighting or refuelling.
- Maintain the air flow to the fire all night.
- Get your chimney checked and cleaned annually.
- Check your chimney to see if it is smoking excessively.
- Never burn rubbish, painted or chemically treated wood.
- Never shut down the air flow and allow your heater to smoulder overnight.



Wells Park exceeds expectations

Last winter, more than 6,000 seedlings were planted at Wells Park, and we are happy to report they survived summer!

In fact, they are thriving, with an estimated 95% of plants successfully established in the dunes overlooking Kwinana Beach. Planted over a three-day planting blitz with the help of City of Kwinana staff, the community, and Perth NRM staff, the new vegetation plays an important role in preventing erosion. Below the surface, healthy and extensive root systems help hold the sand together against wind and water, while above the ground the plants provide food and habitat for wildlife, and also act as a wind break.

Cardboard guards were also installed around each seedling, increasing visibility

of the planting site and protecting the plants from being eaten by rabbits. The cardboard guards are a more sustainable alternative to the traditional plastic guards, and the 95% success rate suggests they're certainly effective.

This fantastic result would not have been possible without the work undertaken by our experienced volunteers, along with the contribution and support provided by City of Kwinana staff who extensively and expertly prepared the irrigated sites to ensure consistent water supply over the hot summer. Funding for this project was provided by the State Government's Greening Fund, distributed by the City of Kwinana. Thank you to everyone involved!

But the work is not done yet! Ongoing maintenance work is vital to keep weeds at bay, and an additional 500 seedlings will be planted this year to increase the stability and biodiversity of the dunes, thanks to an additional grant from Coastwest.

Shot-hole Borer

Metropolitan gardeners have been urged to maintain vigilance during winter and continue to look for and report two significant exotic plant pests that could devastate the State's valuable agriculture industries, home gardens and the environment.

The serious environmental and agricultural pest polyphagous shothole borer (PSHB) has been detected in the Perth metro area.

Look for multiple holes on the trunk or branches that are approximately the size of a ballpoint pen tip, and frass (noodles) or crystalline foam (sugar volcanoes) coming from the holes.

Ofly is a destructive pest that we are trying to keep out of Western Australia. It can infest over 300 different types of fruit and fruiting vegetables, and it has been recently detected in the Perth suburbs.

If you suspect you have borer damage to trees or Qfly, make a report to the department through the Pest and Disease Information Service on 9368 3080, via the department's MyPestGuide™ Reporter app or email padis@dpird.wa.gov.au
