

## A sustainable future for <u>Kwinana</u>

The City has endeavoured to become a more sustainable local government in recent years, with the catalyst being the switching of 12 facilities to renewable energy sourced from a wind farm in the State's South West.

Since joining the WA Local Government Association (WALGA) agreement with 48 other Councils in April 2022, the City alone has saved 2300 tonnes of carbon from entering our atmosphere between April 2022 and September 2023.

This renewable energy now powers the City's new electric mower at the Depot's charging shed, and a truck is now fitted with solar panels to charge the electric tools used to beautify the City's centre.

The City is increasingly swapping out diesel powered tools for electric alternatives and powering them through renewable energy.

Electric models of landscaping tools like brush-cutters are often cheaper than combustion equivalents.

While the mower cost \$14,000 more at purchase, it saves \$9,000 per year in fuel, avoiding the need to purchase 100L of diesel a week.

This leads to savings within two years of ownership when factoring in charging costs.

Electric models are also quieter and do not emit fumes like petrol models,

making them safer for both operators and residents.

There are now four EV vehicles in the City's fleet purchased at competitive fleet prices with significantly lower running costs.

In the past year, two charging stations have been made available to the public at the Kwinana Adventure Park and the City Administration Building.

Mayor Peter Feasey said Council recently adopted a Sustainability Framework, drawing from the existing Strategic Community Plan which identifies the community's priorities.

"The Sustainability Framework outlines the overarching principles, outcomes and performance indicators that the City will work towards to advance sustainability throughout the organisation and the City as a whole," Mayor Feasey said.

While the Waste to Energy facility located in the Kwinana's Industrial Area is expected to come online this year to divert the City's general waste from landfill, a third bin known as the Garden Organics (GO) bin will also be rolled out next year to residents so their garden organics like prunings, leaves, weeds and lawn clippings can be composted. These changes will both result in better waste recovery for Kwinana.

"Sustainability is at the heart of what we do in the City of Kwinana, not only from an environmental perspective but also from economic and social perspectives," Mayor Feasey said. "We need to address the needs of both current and future generations, and feedback from the community consistently demonstrates people living here value the environment and sustainability.

"The Kwinana Industrial Area (KIA) is also transitioning to become a hub for renewable industries seeking to create new futures that better support the environment along with their economic priorities.

"It is exciting to see what new innovations develop in the KIA, and the City is committed to a sustainable future for all."

## Brigade Recruitment Drive

After a long hot and dry summer in Kwinana, the Mandogalup and Kwinana South Volunteer Bush Fire Brigades are looking for new recruits to train for the summer ahead.

In November 2023, Michael and Jeanette Harris experienced a close call when fire suddenly entered their Wellard property with just the local brigades to fend it off and protect their home.

"It was a scary moment as we didn't yet have a fire plan because we'd just moved in three days prior," Mrs Harris said.

"A neighbour came to our front door to alert us but I couldn't find my car keys in the mess of unpacking so we couldn't leave.

"I was outside directing the firies to come in at the gate as we had to move our three alpacas to the house section of the property for their protection.

"We didn't even have a proper hose with

water pressure and everything was a bit overgrown.

"The fire came close, but the fire brigade was able to save the sheds and house, and the alpacas, and we are working hard to prepare the property and replacing damaged fencing," she said.

Chief Bush Fire Control Officer Chris Wells said a recruitment drive for the two local volunteer brigades would kick off in April to help save more lives and homes in the future.

"Volunteer firefighters attend fire incidents, training, community preparedness events and controlled burns," Mr Wells said.

"Brigades meet once a week in the evening for activities which include meetings, training, maintenance, and social nights – for the Mandogalup brigade this is on a Monday and a Tuesday for the Kwinana South brigade.



"While people are giving of their time they will also be enjoying a sense of camaraderie, teamwork, training opportunities and community service all while meeting new people."

Requirements to join include being 18 years or older with a Manual C class driver's licence, MR license desirable.

Volunteers also need to live within 10 minutes of the station and have the ability to conduct manual work for a minimum of six hours.

Volunteers also need to have a positive can-do attitude, an ability to work cohesively within a team environment, strong safety awareness and demonstrating self-control during stressful situations is also essential.

The Summer Sounds Concert in the Park returned to Bertram on 17 February with the dynamic sounds of SWITCH, drawing crowds to enjoy a relaxed and entertaining night out.

Mayor Peter Feasey said the beloved family-friendly event would next take place on Sloan's Reserve in Leda on 23 March bringing international cuisines, crafts and cultural music in a special celebration.

"For the first time, Summer Sounds will feature an array of cultural performances to celebrate Kwinana's richly diverse community," Mayor Feasey said.

"Our community is growing rapidly, and we are welcoming people every day to the City who choose Kwinana in which to live, work and raise their families," he said.

Presented by Wesfarmers Chemicals, Energy and Fertilisers, Summer Sounds in Leda will feature an array of food trucks with an exciting, but limited, opportunity to purchase a \$10 Food Passport. The Food Passport will provide the opportunity to experience a selection of international cuisines.

"You will also have the chance to learn cultural crafts such as origami and calligraphy, or grab a native tea and listen to local Aboriginal Elders share their stories of the land," Mayor Feasey said. "The Little Boorloo Dance group will take to the main stage and Olman Walley will give a didgeridoo performance.

"Indonesian Fusion will showcase the amazing diversity within the Indonesian community and the Mbria of Zimbabwe will play the African instrument also known as the 'thumb piano'.

"Around the reserve will be roaming performances by the Muchos Mariachi band, Bollywood stilt walkers and the incredible LED Chinese Lion and Dragon dancers.

"So grab a picnic blanket and walk or cycle down to Sloan's Reserve for this local event from 4:30pm to 7:30pm and immerse yourself in an evening filled with cultural showcases, performances, and workshops," he said.



The City now has an iconic entry statement referencing First Nations heritage in the area.

Cara Djubak (pronounced ka-ra ju-bak) stands 10m tall and is visible from the Thomas Road off-ramp in Casuarina.

It features a representation of a yooral (carrying bowl) filled with delicate spider orchids and broadly references the significance of the surrounding land to Nyoongar people, including five known Aboriginal Heritage sites in the area.

The artwork was funded by Main Roads (\$300,000) and using developer contributions (\$250,000) that are assigned for public art.

The artist team selected for the project was a collaboration between Susan Milne, Greg Stonehouse and Nyoongar Yamatji artist Justin Martin, supported by Nyoongar Yamatji cultural advisor Cheryl Martin and a technical team.

Deputy Mayor Barry Winmar, who co-chairs the Boola Maara (Many Hands)

Advisory Group, which was involved in developing the artist brief and selecting the final artwork, said Justin Martin's art was based around traditional techniques and stories passed down from his grandmothers, and a prominent Elder local to Kwinana.

"The design includes spider orchids as they were part of the Nyoongar spring diet with the stem eaten and the flowers used for ceremonial headdresses," Deputy Mayor Winmar said.

"The yooral, or carrying bowl, was often used by Nyoongar women as a vessel for carrying babies, food and tools," he said.

Elders and Councillors gathered with the

artist team and a Main Roads representative at the site to view the artwork soon after it's installation, and the artist team held a workshop to share the process with the community.

## Medina neighbours cleaning up

Medina neighbours Bart Verwilligen and Olivier Roy are helping keep their suburb green and clean.

Bart Verwilligen has taken part in Clean Up Australia Day for more than a decade, with the latest cleanup on Sunday, March 3. "We started out clearing cigarette butts and wrappers at Pace Road then ventured into the bush along a 1km stretch of Gentle Road to discover illegally dumped items," Mr Verwilligen said of his 10-year commitment.

"We've found bonnets of cars, wheels and gas tanks, a set of crockery, stainless steel watering cans and even dumped asbestos sheets we arranged to be safely removed.

"Once we even found 50 open and empty tins of cat food," Mr Verwilligen said.

As a former president of the Medina Residents Group, Bart said sometimes he'd had a team of up to eight with him, and collected about five tonnes of rubbish over the years.

Each year, the City of Kwinana had organised a truck to remove the collected rubbish from Clean Up Australia Day.

Olivier Roy and wife Vicki live just behind Bart and together over the past 15 years they have rehabilitated parts of the bush near Thomas Oval, and also at Harry McGuigan Park near Ngalang Moort Manjar.

Using greening grants sourced through the Medina Residents Group, they fenced off a rehabilitated section, mulched, and built a watering system.

Olivier also collects a tank of water from the City Depot to hand water plants where necessary and regularly clears rubbish to give the plants the best chance of success, with many trees now towering several metres tall in just two years.

"We have planted tuarts and banksia and only species endemic to this area," Mr Roy said.

Ross River virus was detected in January in mosquitoes in the City of Kwinana by the Department of Health mosquito disease surveillance program.

Mosquito management is being undertaken by the City in areas with a recognised risk of Ross River virus activity but it is important for residents to also protect themselves from bites.

Protect yourself while outdoors by ensuring you take precautions against mosquito bites during this time of the year.

- Cover up wear long, loose-fitting, light-coloured clothing, covering as much of the body as you can.
- Repel when you're outdoors and mosquitoes are present, apply insect repellent containing DEET (diethyltoluamide) or picaridin evenly to exposed skin.
- Clean Up simple changes around your home can reduce mosquito breeding. Remove, empty or cover water-holding containers.

## A brighter bike library

The exciting new bike library concept is leaving a positive legacy in Kwinana by linking unclaimed or donated bikes with students at Orelia Primary School.

The Orelia Bike Library is a collaborative effort between the City of Kwinana, Orelia Primary School, WA Police, and Neighbourhood Watch.

The bike library is housed at the primary school and Junior Neighbourhood Watch students got involved in painting the shed's exterior to brighten it up and helping school staff register the bikes with Bikelinc.

Unclaimed bikes and scooters from WA Police, and some donated by the public, are given a new lease of life at the school.

Children are able to borrow the bikes to ride to school, increasing their physical activity and helping prevent childhood obesity while improving emotional wellbeing.

A spare parts library including bells and baskets is being considered, and the bike library initiative is a model that can be rolled out in other schools.

At the end of 2023, the bike library presented a wonderful opportunity for Year 6 student Nyakong Mathiang, who was keen to learn to ride but hadn't had the opportunity prior.

Orelia Primary School Marketing and Library Officer "Miss Julie" Gliddon taught Nyakong to ride on one of the borrowed bikes.

Together, they then rode from the school to a live radio broadcast by the ABC held in November 2023 to promote the bike library.

#### Gilmore Avenue Shared <u>Path</u>

In a bid to foster an environment where people are supported and encouraged to walk, wheel or ride our city is taking a significant stride with the Gilmore Avenue Shared Path Project.
