Kwinana Waste to Energy Facility

Kwinana's new Waste to **Energy Facility is a sustainable** solution to waste disposal, set to produce energy from the City of Kwinana's waste.

The facility will generate enough electricity to power 50,000 homes per year (38MW) and will divert more than 460,000 tonnes of waste from landfill.

This will reduce carbon emissions equivalent to taking 85,000 cars off Perth's roads.

Mayor Peter Feasey said the facility marked a significant advancement in waste management, aligning with the Strategic Community Plan and the City's Sustainability Framework.

"Costs are similar to traditional landfill methods, which ensures it is a cost-effective option for local governments," Mayor Feasey said.



"The Kwinana Waste to Energy Facility is situated in the Kwinana Industrial Area, enhancing the KIA's global reputation as an innovation and sustainability hub.

In addition to energy production, metals will be removed from remnant ash and the ash will then be reused to produce construction materials such as road base and civil blocks.

Council Plan collects the community's vision

The Kwinana Recquatic Centre's Ben Hewitt discovered a memorial shield in a storeroom and sought to find out more about it.

The sports supervisor learned the shield was in honour of Hope Valley's Sean Powers who unexpectedly and suddenly died on 12 May 2007, at just 21 years of age.

A passionate Futsal player and one of five children, Sean was playing up until two weeks before his passing.

Sean's brother Colin Powers told Ben that Sean was playing in a team with Colin and his older brother Matthew Powers until he began to feel unwell.

It wasn't until after his death that a coroner's report discovered Sean had in fact had leukaemia.

The family was keen to see the tournament reinstated, so Ben organised the event for January.

Three of Sean's brothers – Colin, Matthew, and William – took part in the 2024 Futsal competition with a total of eight teams participating on the Kwinana Recquatic's courts.

Winning team 'Tekkerlactico' was engraved in the Sean Powers Memorial Shield.

"Ben did a great job in organising the event, bringing all the teams together, paying tribute to Sean, and there was a great barbecue put on by the Recquatic after the event," Colin Powers said.

"Given the history of the event, it attracted quite a good crowd of spectators and there were a number of people from other teams that remembered Sean back from the days when he used to play.

"Sean was an electrical technician and we both worked at the Kwinana Power Station together, where he was known for his laughter around the workshop," he said.

Sean's father Steve Powers said the family was happy to hear the Shield was reinstated.

"We are really happy to hear that the Memorial Shield has been revived, and it is fitting to have our boy Sean remembered in a healthy pursuit to be enjoyed by fit and healthy young people," Mr Powers said.

Ben's efforts to reinstate the tournament were recognised by the City of Kwinana at its first Town Hall meeting of the year for City staff.

Riding to school gets the red carpet treatment



How your rates are calculated





How your rates are calculated

It's nearly that time of the year again, rates time! Have you ever wondered how your rates are calculated?

Calculating the amount of rates everyone in the City should pay is a pretty complex task. Local Governments calculate the rates to be paid on your individual property by using the following formula: property valuation multiplied by the rate in the dollar (RiD) = rates payable.

Firstly, the City calculates the rate in the dollar (RiD) by determining its own operating costs, which includes the cost of labour, or jobs, the cost of materials, such as light fittings and gardening equipment, the cost of running programs and events and providing support services to the community.

Then the City divides its operating costs, which it tries to offset by seeking funding from other sources such as the State or Federal Governments, by the value of all the 'rateable properties' in Kwinana, which calculates the rate in the dollar (RiD).

The value of the rateable properties in Kwinana is determined by Landgate, of the WA State Government, who values the total properties in the City of Kwinana and calls this the 'Gross Rental Valuation' or GRV. This valuation is reviewed every three years, with the last valuation occurring on 1 July 2023, which is used' to help calculate the share of rates to be paid by each landowner.

The property valuation, or GRV, is then multiplied by the rate in the dollar (RiD) to calculate the rates payable for each property.



The City of Kwinana is collaborating with the Keep Carnaby's Flying: Ngoolarks Forever project to develop a Community Action Plan that will help our much-loved Ngoolarks, or Carnaby's cockatoos, to survive and thrive in the region.

Funded by Lotterywest, the project is embedded with science and aims to get the community involved in various stages.

The City will be provided with mature trees to plant in strategic locations to

provide more food trees for the iconic but threatened Carnaby's cockatoos.

It will also strategically place water sources, similar to the bird waterer installed by the City on Council Green in 2021, close to known roost sites to prevent heat stress.

Good Sammy's textile verge collection

Results of Good Sammy's textile collection for Wellard, Leda and Calista were encouraging with residents donating more than 10,000kg of preloved items in three weeks.

An average of eight percent of households participated in the service.

Wellard's standalone participation rate was 12 per cent with more than 6500kg donated in the first week. More than 90 per cent of items donated were of good quality, resulting in an estimated 161 tonnes of avoided carbon emissions.

Clothing formed the largest proportion of donated items at 69 per cent, five per cent was manchester including towels and cushions, and seven per cent was accessories and shoes.

The next textile verge collection is expected to be held in March next year.



Immersive exhibition celebrates **NAIDOC Week**

An immersive exhibition will take place during Kwinana's celebration of NAIDOC Week celebrating the 2024 theme 'Keep the fire burning! Blak, loud and proud'.

The exhibition will feature stunning portraits of local community members taken by Kerry-Anne deKlerk, gathered in honour of the Medina Aboriginal Cultural Centre's 50th anniversary. The exhibition will also feature a series of local truth-telling oral histories to listen to, and gorgeous artworks provided by Fremantle Press from the pages of a children's book called

Nedingar: Ancestors. This book was authored by Isobel Bevis, who is a program coordinator at Gilmore College for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Education, and illustrated by Leanne Zilm as a lyrical dual language picture book as a celebration of Country and family. The exhibition will be held at Ken Jackman Hall within the Darius Wells Library and Resource Centre from 24 June to 29 June, opening from 10am to 4pm Monday to Friday, until 7pm on Thursday 27 June, and 9am to 2pm on Saturday 29 June.

Celebrations are held earlier in Kwinana to allow people to attend NAIDOC Week celebrations (7 July to 14 July) in other parts of Perth.







The City worked with Noongar researcher and writer Cass Lynch, contemporary artist Amanda Bell, and the local community, on an artwork at Ngook Boorn Mia Mia / Honeywood Pavilion.

As the City's first dual-named building, the artwork explores the importance of language and how it connects us to the past, present and future.

The artwork consists of two-components.

Cass Lynch, after extensive engagement with the community, developed a poem written in Noongar and English.

This poem will be available to be listened to at the site on an audio unit known as a U-turn because you turn it to make the sound play.

On this U-turn there will also be a QR code that links to a short film about the

project, the poem, and further information on the artwork. This aspect of the artwork is expected to be installed in June. Amanda Bell's work has recently been installed on the pavilion.

It is a striking neon work that reflects and speaks to the poetry.

The work is a combination of text and a hand-drawn mapping of the wetlands across this area.

The artwork has been funded through the City's internal percent for art policy for new development.



Bat boxes support microbat populations in Henley Reserve

Nightstalk leader Joe Tonga was thrilled to discover microbats using one of a handful of bat boxes installed in Henley Reserve.

Several designs were hung on the trees to research the preferred options for the Reserve's population of microbats.

Mr Tonga retrieved a Gould's Wattled Bat from the box to show participants of a recent nightstalk.

"Bats usually roost in hollows in old trees, and feed on a variety of insects, particularly moths and beetles," City of Kwinana Environment Officer Angela Jakob said

"Due to their reliance on tree hollows for roosting, it is important to have old trees in the landscape for habitat.

"As trees age and die they are able to produce hollows suitable for nesting and roosting for a variety of species.

"Where these are no longer available, bat boxes can assist to supplement their habitat.";: she said.

Transforming grassed or bare verges into native havens for local flora and fauna is Leda resident Behrooz Eslam's passion.

He made over his own verge in just few years, mostly using tubestock sourced using the City of Kwinana's seedling subsidy.

The seedling subsidy is offered in May during the Living Green series held by the City each year, providing native seedlings at a subsidised rate from the Australian Native Nursery on King Road.

This year, a native verge garden workshop was also held during Living Green to inspire and educate residents ahead of the popular subsidy's release.

Mr Eslam said he started the transformation five years ago.

"I had a bobcat take 10cm off the soil, then I topped it with soil conditioner, cardboard and a heavy mulching to prevent grass regrowing," Mr Eslam said.

"I didn't do much planting the first year but then put in an extra verge tree requested from the Council, a Red Gum, and hand-watered all the seedlings to build connection with the people living here, just to have a chat which helps to protect my own property from possible break in and I encourage them to grow their own where they can."

Due to being on a corner block, Mr Eslam needs to keep certain plants trimmed to allow for driver visibility and pedestrian access, but the garden is providing a wealth of food for local wildlife while cooling his home and improving the aesthetic appeal of his street.

"I have about 25 species of birds visit, including Carnaby's cockatoos which just recently came to feast on the banksia for the first time," Mr Eslam said.

"There are about 200 plants here, and the whole property, out the front and back, is based on permaculture principles."




