
We gathered the community together in Honeywood Oval for the one and only Summer Sounds event of the season, and look forward to the Lolly Run once again for a week prior to Christmas.

# **New Council**

Four Councillors were sworn in to Council following the 18 **October Local Government** Election.

32,117 voter packages were sent out, with 8,271 (25.5 per cent) returned by Election Day. Erin Sergeant, Barry Winmar, and Matthew Rowse were all re-elected while Balian Miller was voted to Council for the first time. All four were sworn in on 29 October where Barry Winmar was once again elected Deputy Mayor by the Council. Councillors Barry Winmar and Ivy

Penny were appointed to Boola Maara (Many Hands) Aboriginal Consultative Committee. You can find the details for all Elected Members and their appointments to Committees at kwinana.wa.gov.au/Councillors



Boola Maara (Many Hands) marked its first full year as an Aboriginal Consultative Committee on 1 July, providing a wealth of feedback and insights into matters coming before Council that are of relevance to the local Aboriginal community.

Boola Maara discussed the Aboriginal Cultural Protocols Guidelines for the City, provided feedback on the Early Years Strategy, the Arts and Culture Strategy, and the Writing Style Guide. They received briefings about the three-bin rollout and advised on community engagement processes.

Boola Maara also provided advice to the Koorliny Arts Centre about

improving inclusivity and creating a culturally safe space with diverse programming. The Committee also reviewed the Urban Forest Strategy, Economic Development Strategy and the Kwinana Trails Master Plan and has been a part of the naming of new community facilities.

The Consultative Committee also heard briefings about the Kwinana Wind Zone,

Sites of Truth Telling Project, the mural at Kwinana Marketplace, and Regional Open Space.

The Committee even provided advice on events like Summer Sounds Leda to make them culturally inclusive, and were involved in the Apex Park upgrade and Zone community partnerships plus the City's Environment Strategy and Animal, Environment and Amenity Local Law.

The City thanks all members for their time and insights over the last financial year, including Cr Barry Winmar, Paul Garlett, Doris Getta, Cindy Ballard, Marie Walley, Marianne Headland Mckay, Lisa Garlett and Cr Matthew Rowse.

## **Fire Support Vehicles** for **Brigades**

The City transferred two exfleet Isuzu DMAX dual cab vehicles to its Volunteer Bush Fire Brigades in September.

The vehicles replace ageing Ford Ranger vehicles donated by the BP Kwinana Refinery in 2018 and are fitted out with modern features critical for crew safety.

The Fire Support Vehicles play a vital role in crew changeovers, incident command, logistics, training, community engagement, and interagency support.

The City of Kwinana will continue to cover registration, insurance, and

maintenance costs, while the brigades will equip the vehicles to meet Department of Fire and Emergency Services (DFES) standards.

The Kwinana South Volunteer Bush Fire Brigade has secured a \$10,000 State Government grant for its fitout, and Mandogalup Volunteer Bush Fire Brigade has received a \$15,000 Alcoa grant to complete the upgrades.

This initiative demonstrates the City's commitment to equipping volunteer brigades with safe, reliable, and fit-for-purpose resources to support their essential service to the community.

### **New cameras in Kwinana**

The City of Kwinana, in partnership with WA Police, has installed new **Automatic Number Plate** Recognition (ANPR) cameras at key locations to:

- Detect stolen or suspicious vehicles in real time
- Support police investigations with valuable intelligence
- Track vehicle movements to help locate missing or absent persons
- Act as a visible crime deterrent
- Boost community safety through 24/7 monitoring by police

This initiative marks Kwinana's first integration into the metro ANPR system, reinforcing its commitment to public safety and crime prevention.













# **Early Years Strategy**

The Kwinana Early Years Strategy 2026-2029 will set a bold vision that all children aged zero to five and their families thrive in a connected and caring community where everyone has access to high-quality supports.

The development of the Strategy was shaped through extensive community consultation and collaboration with parents, children, local service providers, and early childhood professionals. Engagement opportunities included workshops and online surveys through the Love My Kwinana platform, where residents shared insights into the challenges and opportunities faced by young families.

Children showed what was important to them through conversations and a variety of artworks. This feedback informed the Strategy's guiding principles and commitments, ensuring it truly reflects local needs and aspirations.

More than eight per cent of our young community is aged 0-4 years, so this is a vital part of our role as a Local Government to strengthen community and support the achievement of key outcomes identified in the Australian Government's Early Years Strategy 2024-2034.

Kwinana's sense of community and belonging, its support services and events, the connection to nature and ability to play in safe communities with ready access to great facilities makes Kwinana an attractive place for families.



But cost of living and financial stress is also very real, and families have said this impacts on their ability to access transport, services, and events.

Families have also expressed a need for greater connection and sense of community safety so the Early Years Strategy will work to meet those needs through the ten commitments outlined in the Strategy.

## Koort of Medina sculptures project

Koort of Medina is a new public space in the heart of Medina, connecting the Laneway to the Green.



In Nyoongar, Koort means 'heart', so the name for the space means 'The Heart of Medina'. The space was created through a collaboration between the City and the Medina Residents' Group which celebrated its 20th year in 2025.

Thanks to local Medina volunteer tradies, the laneway between the Tavern and Hairdressers at the Pace Road Shopping Centre was opened up, making it more inviting and easier to move through.

The group, mainly made up of dads, plan to add festoon lighting for events, and interactive footpath art for kids to further enhance the Taverns upgrade of the lounge area.

Meanwhile, ten local Medina residents under the mentoring of highly acclaimed sculptor Lesley Barrett created 11 hand carved sculptures installed in the Koort.

These residents now have the skills, knowledge and tools to continue sculpting artworks for Medina with one of the next projects being the dead tree on Medina Green!

A big thank you to the Kwinana Volunteer Service for your collaboration and making this amazing project happen.






# Outcome **Environmental Stewardship**







As you head into the New Year with a resolution to tackle that annual clean out, be sure to make use of your pre-booked verge collection, local op shops and Buy Nothing groups!

Residential properties receive up to five collections a year, collected from your verge at a time that suits you.

Two collections, of either bulk waste or green waste, can be booked for amounts up to three cubic metres.

Residents can also book up to three collections for either one mattress, one white good item, or six e-waste items.

This pre-booked service offers a flexible system allowing you to dispose of bulky waste items year-round, at a time that is convenient to you.

You can book your verge collection service through the online portal or by calling the City's contractor on 1300 867 166.

Simply create an account in the online portal, include your email address and phone number, search your address, then book! It's that easy.

Extra collections can be purchased for a fee if you use up all your allocated collections.

The introduction of the City's three-bin Garden Organics (GO) system has had a clear positive impact on resource recovery. Since the rollout, waste tonnage has reduced by 27% with over 1,202 tonnes of GO collected and recycled up to September!

GO collection tonnages have steadily increased each month since being introduced. This shows that more and more of our green waste is being recycled into compost instead of being sent to energy recovery, helping the City of Kwinana progress toward its sustainability and waste reduction goals.

Don't forget that smaller residential properties under 350sqm can opt in to the GO Bin at any time, free of charge via our online request system or calling the City.



#### Annual Weed Blitz

The City's annual weed blitz for special rural properties removed the equivalent of 94 green waste collections in Wandi, Casuarina and Wellard! Some properties had their entire 50m verge covered with removed weeds, awaiting disposal by the City. This year targeted Sydney Gold Wattle (Acacia longifolia) and Flinders Range Wattle (Acacia iteaphylla).

## **Administration Building** Refurbishment and **Building Updates**

It is a busy time of redevelopment and some new builds in Kwinana!

Construction works have commenced on the Administration Building Refurbishment which is scheduled for completion in September 2026.

During this time Council administration services will be accessible from 11 Stidworthy Way, Kwinana Town Centre.

Kwinana Recquatic Refurbishment's concept design process is well underway, with the aim to progress to the engagement of a builder early in 2026.

The construction of a new pavilion in Wellard West, named Djilba Pavilion, is also well underway with completion scheduled for May 2026.

Construction of the new changerooms on Thomas Oval, known as Djandoo Mia, is scheduled for completion May 2026.





#### The City's trails came under the spotlight, with the development and adoption of the Kwinana Trails Network Master Plan.

This is a major step forward in setting a vision for both established and future trails development within the City of Kwinana.

The plan, adopted in August, sets a framework for our trails development and highlights key regional and local linkages that connect communities to each other and the surrounding natural and cultural environment.

This includes the Kwinana Loop Trail which the City has received a Federal funding commitment of \$2.5 million to see the Kwinana Loop Trail Hub developments come to fruition.

The City has also commenced the planning of surface upgrades and key connection detailed design as part of the \$3.5 million commitment from the State Department of Creative Industries, Tourism and Sport.


of An Evening with Casey Donovan.


## In Case You Missed It
