On 6 August, we announced a significant partnership with Minderoo Foundation to better support children aged zero to five years, and their parents and caregivers. This type of partnership is a first for Local Government and is designed to holistically transform the early years ecosystem so every child can thrive right here in Kwinana. We look forward to the City's Administration building

refurbishment reaching completion later this year, and also look forward to seeing the proposed designs for the Recquatic Redevelopment which are now being finalised. We officially opened Djandoo Mia, the new changerooms at Thomas Oval, and we continue to work with the Kwinana Golf Club to transition the golf course facility to a City-managed model. Spring is a season to celebrate biodiversity and the large body of work being done to boost our canopy and be more sustainable. I was also thrilled to see that the City's well-loved kids clothing swap run by the Kwinana Public

Library each school holidays attracted State-wide attention in July for its innovation and collaborative efforts to meet community needs amid cost of living impacts and strong environmental values. Next month our Community Safety Series kicks off, and you'll find an extensive breakdown of local stats within this edition to keep you informed as we strengthen community safety together. The Nyoongar seasonal calendar includes six different seasons in a yearly cycle.

Djilba is the first Spring, the season of conception with a mix of wet days and increasing number of clear, cold nights and warm days. Kambarang begins around October with the season of birth, the second spring, with longer dry periods of weather.



Love My Kwinana

The City's engagement hub Love My Kwinana is an online platform for you to provide feedback on a variety of projects and plans. In the past year, the number of visits to Love My Kwinana grew 25 per cent to nearly 70,000 visits, with feedback contributions doubling. The online engagement rate rose 140 per cent with key community consultation projects including the Community Safety Survey (2138 responses) the Danjoo Ngalang Maara – Reconciliation Strategy consultation (714 responses), and the Litter and Illegal Dumping Survey (533 responses).

Minderoo partnership for Early Years

The City of Kwinana and Minderoo Foundation have announced a \$4.09 million partnership over 2.5 years to lay the foundations for lasting change to create better outcomes for children and families in Kwinana.

The investment will strengthen the systems that support children from birth to five years of age, with a focus on improving access to transport, food security, perinatal care and community-based child health and development services, while creating stronger collaboration between organisations already delivering outstanding work across Kwinana.

The partnership builds on several years of work by the City, in partnership with

many local organisations, schools and others, to strengthen the local early years system and create better outcomes for children and families.

City of Kwinana Mayor Peter Feasey said the partnership represented one of the most significant investments in the City's future.

"The early years shape the future of every child, and by investing in those years we are investing in the future of our entire community."

Minderoo Foundation CEO John Hartman said the early years lay the foundation for lifelong learning and wellbeing, but achieving the best outcomes for children required collaboration.

"Minderoo is proud to back Kwinana's ambition because we believe communities are best placed to mould the solutions that work for them. Our hope is that this place-based approach can become a model for

how local leadership and philanthropy work together to improve outcomes for children across Australia," Mr Hartman said.

Premier Roger Cook thanked the generous support of Minderoo Foundation and the City of Kwinana and congratulated them on this significant initiative.

The partnership will be implemented over three initial phases through to the end of 2028.

The first phase will establish a dedicated Early Years Team, undertake a comprehensive analysis of Kwinana's early years ecosystem, deliver a community Early Years Summit, launch an Early Years Impact Fund and investigate the feasibility of an Orelia Early Years Hub.

Future phases will focus on strengthening collaborative governance, investing in proven initiatives and embedding long-term systems change that continues delivering benefits for local children and families.

The initiative aims to ensure more children start their schooling journey healthy, supported and ready to learn while strengthening the capability of families, communities and local institutions to improve outcomes for future generations.

Library wins award for clothing swap

Kwinana Public Library won an innovation and collaboration award for the kids clothing swap held each school holidays.

In just one year, the swap experienced a 500 per cent increase in the number of families taking clothes and more than 562kg of textiles were diverted from landfill.

The number of clothes donated also rose 150 per cent.

The Library received \$5000 as part of the Library Board of WA's Innovation and Collaboration Award for the Metro and Large Regional category in July in

recognition of its collaborative approach to working with local families and the City's circularity team.

Many barriers were removed by making the program free, adjusting times of pick-ups to meet community needs, not requiring families to donate to be able to take clothes, and donating the remaining clothes to local organisations.

YouThrive Pathways

The City of Kwinana is investing in the future of local young people through the YouThrive Pathways Program.

This program helps young people gain the confidence and practical skills needed for future success, offering free training for young people aged 14 to 24 years who live, work or study in Kwinana.

YouThrive is proudly supported by Eclipse Soils, whose funding support also increased the number of LYRIK

Scholarships by four to 16, with 54 applicants vying for a scholarship.

Twelve young people completed the TAFE Leadership Certificate delivered at The Zone, and barista training was offered to young mums at the Moorditj Kulungar Playgroup. The Future Ready Kwinana event in August provided opportunities for young people to

obtain identification documents, and connect with local support services and job ready opportunities.

Community Safety

Community safety continues to be the top priority raised by residents, and the City of Kwinana is continuing to roll out programs and initiatives designed to help make Kwinana safer, more connected and more resilient.

In October 2025, the City partnered with WA Police to survey residents, visitors and workers across all 17 Kwinana suburbs with 2100 responses.

The results captured how residents genuinely feel and pointed to consistent areas of concern, a sign these issues are citywide, not just localised.

What residents tell us they're worried about doesn't always match what the crime data shows, and that's why the City tracks both, to make sure programs respond to what people feel and what's actually happening. The figures below are a snapshot of some key crime trends across the area, and do not represent the full range of offences or activity being managed by local police.

What the City has done, and is continuing to do

- ✓ 11 Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) cameras installed across Kwinana, accessed and monitored exclusively by WA Police, supporting the detection of stolen vehicles and investigations into offences including burglary and arson
- ✓ CCTV network expanded and upgraded to improve surveillance and support WA Police investigations
- ✓ Community safety subsidies available for CCTV, sensor lights, parcel letterboxes, Safe and Found registration and more

- ✓ Street Meets and neighbourhood engagement programs helping to strengthen local connections and improve reporting of suspicious activity
- ✓ 119 community safety activations delivered in the 2024–2025 financial year
- ✓ More than 40 free events delivered through the Spring Community Safety Series in October, with further activations running throughout the year
- ✓ Ongoing partnership with WA Police and key stakeholders on crime prevention, information sharing and coordinated responses to emerging safety concerns

Get involved

Community safety isn't something the City or WA Police can deliver alone, it's built by community. Reporting concerns, looking out for neighbours and getting involved in local programs is what turns data into real, lasting change.

From CCTV and parcel letterboxes to Street Meets and neighbourhood initiatives, there is a range of subsidies and programs available to help you get involved in keeping Kwinana safe.

Golf Course

Kwinana Golf Course has a rich history of community management but ageing infrastructure and growing demand for quality recreation locally makes it the perfect time to invest in the future of this facility.

The Kwinana Golf Course has been part of the local community for more than 65 years and the Kwinana Golf Club's members, volunteers and staff played a significant role in developing and maintaining one of the City's most valued sporting facilities.

As the course transitions to a City-managed model, the City's intent is to build on this legacy, preserve the Club's history and support the Kwinana Golf Club's continuation of regular golf activities, including club competitions.

The course's ageing clubhouse and infrastructure, including irrigation, now needs significant investment, so a Master Plan is in development to explore upgrades.

The golf course is uniquely positioned to capitalise on a major strategic opportunity, with no comparable large-scale contemporary golf precinct currently planned south of the river.

The vision is to create one of Perth's leading community golf and recreation destinations south of the river.

The Master Plan will explore potential opportunities for the precinct to

operate on a financially sustainable basis and generate revenue that can be reinvested back into the Kwinana community.

The precinct has the potential to attract significantly more visitors and generate a commercial return by broadening the facility beyond traditional golf to include attractions such as a technology-enabled driving range, executive course under lights, indoor golf simulators and mini-golf, food and beverage, functions and other recreation opportunities.

Any surplus generated by the City-operated facility could be reinvested into community services, programs and infrastructure across Kwinana.

The City's vision is to create new ways for people of all ages and abilities to participate, and attract visitors, supporting local jobs and businesses and establishing a financially sustainable recreation precinct.

These opportunities would be considered as part of future planning, design, engagement, approvals and budget processes.



Small Business support celebrated

Small businesses and sole traders in Kwinana increased by 770 in five years from June 2020 to 2025, bringing the total to 2750.

Research commissioned by the Small Business Development Corporation showed a growth of 39 per cent, more than double the statewide growth rate of 19 per cent.

Kwinana also ranked 12th in Western Australia for the absolute increase in small business numbers despite being one of the smaller metropolitan local government areas.

The independent research demonstrated growing confidence in Kwinana as a place to invest, work and do business, Mayor Feasey said.

"Small businesses are part of the fabric of our community. They create local jobs, provide essential services, stimulate investment, activate our commercial centres and help build vibrant neighbourhoods," he said.

Several years of focused work by the City had improved the experience of establishing and operating a small business, including the online Business Hub, support grants and regular business meet ups.





Celebrating Biodiversity this Spring



There's plenty happening in nature as Kwinana moves through Djilba and into Kambarang.

Wildflowers begin to bloom, birds are busy nesting and raising young, and as the weather warms, insects and reptiles become more active.

Throughout Spring, the City is Celebrating Biodiversity with a program of events and activities.

The Annual Wildflower Walk at Sandringham will once again be a highlight of the season, as well as our new Wildflower Walk location in Apsley.

Kwinana Loop Trail update

The Kwinana Loop Trail Upgrade has reached an exciting milestone, with Stage 1A now complete and planning progressing for the next phase of improvements.

The project is enhancing one of Kwinana's most valued recreational assets, creating a safer, more accessible and enjoyable experience for walkers, runners and cyclists while improving connections between local parks, reserves and community destinations.

The next phase of the project, Stage 1B, will focus on improvements within the Leda Nature Reserve with construction expected to commence in early 2027.

A FireWise garden is growing in Kwinana

A new demonstration garden beside the Casuarina Wellard Community Hall shows residents how thoughtful garden design can help reduce bushfire risk while still creating an attractive, waterwise and wildlife-friendly space.

The City partnered with The Forever Project to create a FireWise Demonstration Landscape in proximity to the Kwinana South Fire Station. Approximately 350m², the garden features low-fuel, low-maintenance and waterwise landscaping, while retaining native vegetation and fauna habitat where possible.

It will become a permanent outdoor learning area, with educational signage helping residents discover practical ways they can prepare the areas around their own homes for bushfire season.

A community education event with experts from The Forever Project is planned for Spring.

The project is jointly funded by the City of Kwinana and The Forever Project through funding from the National Emergency Management Agency's Disaster Ready Fund.

Planning a pre-booked verge collection?

Please book your collection before placing items on your verge.

Putting waste out too early can attract illegal dumping, with other people adding unwanted items to your pile. If you make a booking, you are responsible for any non-compliant waste left on the verge that cannot be collected by our contractors. To help ensure your collection runs smoothly, only place approved items out two days before your booking date, and do not add materials that are not accepted.

Be a good neighbour – book your own pre-booked verge collection and only place compliant waste on your own verge.

December is one of our busiest times for verge collection bookings. To secure your preferred collection date and avoid disappointment, we encourage you to book as early as possible.

Summer Sounds meets Bushfire Community Day

The City of Kwinana is partnering with the Department of Fire and Emergency Services (DFES) to deliver a bigger Summer Sounds event this October, bringing live music, family fun and bushfire preparedness together in one major community event.

Held on Saturday, 17 October from 12pm to 5pm, the event will have a strong Bushfire Community Day focus, giving residents the chance to connect with DFES and City teams and learn practical ways to prepare their homes, gardens and families for the warmer months ahead. There will be plenty to see and do throughout the afternoon, including



fire hose demonstrations, firewise gardening information, the RAC Rescue Helicopter, free children's activities and live music from 2pm to 3pm. City teams including Community Safety and Rangers will also be there, with information and services for residents, including dog registrations.



Bushfire and Emergency Preparedness

Now is the time to prepare your home and property for emergencies ahead of the warmer months!

Download the [Emergency WA](#) app for all your emergency alerts, and set watch zones to get early warning of incidents near you.

Next, prepare an emergency kit kept in an accessible place everyone in your home knows about.

Your Emergency Kit should include the items recommended by the [Department of Fire and Emergency Services](#) for you:

- Emergency Evacuation Kit, and
- Staying In Place Emergency Kit

Use the [DFES My Bushfire Plan tool](#) to generate a plan for your household about whether to stay or leave, including considerations for any animals on your property.

You also need to ensure your property complies with the City's Fire Notice with fire breaks installed and maintained on rural properties from 1 December to 31 May inclusive.

Urban areas must comply with the fire notice all year round, ensuring properties are clear of flammable materials, protected from ember attack.

Recquatic Redevelopment Update

Exciting progress is continuing on the Recquatic Redevelopment, with the project now entering the final stages of design.

As planning moves closer to delivery, there will be more opportunities for the community to stay informed and follow the project's key milestones. The redevelopment represents a significant investment in the future of recreation, health, fitness and community connection in Kwinana.

Community Pocket Forest

Orelia is now home to the City's first Community Pocket Forest, designed to cool the suburb once matured while providing food for endangered cockatoos.

Planted in collaboration with Regenerate Australia and thanks to funding by Lotterywest, a 100sqm patch in Hennessy Park is now dense with 300 seedlings featuring 20 local species.

This biodiverse space will grow into a place where the community can spend time to enhance their mental health and wellbeing.



Mature Trees

Do you have a mature tree on your property?

Mature trees are a key source of food for endangered black cockatoos and habitat for our native wildlife but there's a few things to know about their management.



Tuarts are among Western Australia's most iconic and evolved to withstand the environmental conditions of the Swan Coastal Plain including storms.

Shedding small branches and deadwood is a natural self-pruning process to help maintain long-term stability so should not be cause for alarm.

Management or removal of trees should be made on the basis of qualified arboricultural assessment and if deemed healthy, retaining it is generally the safest and most environmental responsible outcome.



Marri grow a significant food source for threatened Carnaby's Black Cockatoos and Red-tailed Black Cockatoos during breeding season when nutritional demands are greatest.

Having food sources nearby to breeding and roosting areas in older eucalypts reduces stress and increases breeding success.

The retention and careful management of native trees such as Marri is therefore vital to supporting their long-term survival.

How to Build a Shed

Need a shed? Check first if you require a permit to install your tin palace. Small sheds of less than 10sqm and less than 2.4m in height do not require a permit and we recommend it is positioned 1m off the boundary.

A larger shed requires a permit and must be positioned away from other dwellings on the property and 1m from the boundary for fire separation.

Permits are available through the Kwinana Connect portal and there are two options depending on your timeline. A BA1 certified permit application requires the applicant to employ the services of an independent building surveyor to issue a BA3 Certificate of Design Compliance which forms part of the application for a building permit. The City has 10 business days to either approve or refuse the application. The second option is an uncertified BA2 permit application where the City's Building Services completes the Certificate of Design Compliance and issues the building permit which can take up to 25 business days. The documents required for each application is the same and application fees apply to both options.
